SILUETA X ASSOCIATION, ECUADOR

In 2013, Silueta X launched campaigns to end gender-based violence in Ecuador. The campaigns documented illegal lesbian conversion "treatments", people facing workplace violence because of their sexual identity, femicide, and trans women being denied access to healthcare or harassed by medical personnel. These campaigns secured several agreements with the government including the creation of a commission to investigate the murders, positive media promotion of LGBTQI human rights, capacity building of LGBTQI individuals as civil servants, and the review of draft laws with a trans lens.

A SEAT AT THE TABLE

Silueta X's founder, Diane Rodriguez, secured legal precedents that protect the trans community from discrimination and violence - including access to name change and legal gender recognition. Despite being the target of kidnappings, death threats, and armed attacks, her 2013 parliamentary candidacy led to the first historic meeting of an LGBTQI organisation with Ecuador's President Rafael Correa.
